My interest in railroads comes from my family ties to it. Both of my grandfathers worked on the railroad, one as a conductor on the Buffalo Rochester & Pittsburgh Ry in Southwestern Pa and the other for the Pittsburg & Shawmut in Brookville, Pa as an engineer. My father, an engineer, and all of his brothers worked for the Baltimore and Ohio/Chessie System out of Rikers yard, just outside Punxsutawney, Pa. Bob died a few years ago and the operators had the chance to purchase equipment from his railroad, those pieces will find a home on my layout as we move era's just a tad from the late 50's/60's into the 70's/80's to move some coal!

I joined the NMRA back in 2013 on a railpass to see what it was all about, I enjoyed the exchange of information and finding likeminded enthusiasts! During my time in the Susquehanna Division I was the newsletter editor and eventually served as the Assistant Superintendent.
